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

ALEITER FROM THE CHIEF

It is with great pleasure that we present the Franklin – Bingham Farms Police Department *Annual Report for 2023.* Significant crime was kept in check during this past year, and that is reflective of the continued hard work and dedication of the police officers, reserve officers, professional staff and our robust mobile watch programs. The police department also enjoys an exceptional partnership with the residents and business leaders in our two villages, and without their strong support maintaining the low crime rates would not be possible.

Significant crime has remained at low levels for both Villages. For example, there were only two (2) residential burglaries during the entire year of 2023. One of those residential burglaries can be attributed to a South American crime organization that had been working throughout Southeastern Michigan during 2023. The commercial properties along Telegraph Road in Bingham Farms, known as the Special Assessment District (SAD), also recorded a very low level of crime last year. In fact, during 2023 the amount of reported crime in the SAD was lower than the previous year, and most of that crime involved the investigation of fraudulent activities such as identity theft. There were no significant amounts of violent crime reported in our Villages, and property crime remained at low levels. The property crime that we investigated largely involved vehicles being broken into overnight, so we continue to encourage our residents to lock their cars and remove all valuable property when leaving vehicles outside overnight.

In terms of personnel changes during 2023, our department unfortunately lost one of our senior leaders to retirement. Lieutenant Mike Bastianelli retired during the year in order to pursue a private sector business opportunity. We wish Mike well in his retirement, and his leadership and guidance will be greatly missed.

Going forward into 2024, a new Deputy Chief has been hired and started in his role at our department. Deputy Chief Curt Lawson retired from a command position at the West Bloomfield Township Police Department and was hired by our department after a lengthy and extensive executive search. We are pleased to have Deputy Chief Lawson's experience and leadership in our department, and he will take over as the Chief of Police later this year upon my retirement.

Since this is likely my last opportunity to write a note for the police department's *Annual Report*, I want to thank everyone in the community for their support over my last 12 years as your Chief. I also wish to thank both Villages' Councils for their support of our agency during my tenure as the Chief of Police. Mostly, however, I want to thank the exceptional police officers and professional staff at the Franklin – Bingham Farms Police Department who have made my job easy. After 42 years in law enforcement, I can say with assurance that the team at the police department are true hard-working and dedicated professionals.



The department places an emphasis on the enforcement of traffic laws as well as providing an input towards the engineering of roads as well as traffic sign placement.

2023 INVESTIGATIVE REPORT 11

NOTABLE CASES



LFA's Thirteen Larceny from Auto reports were taken during the year at eight residences and five businesses. Eight of the vehicles were unlocked, three had windows broken to gain access, and two catalytic converters were taken. In one case, the occupants had just parked their car and gone into a restaurant. They were notified of their vehicle alarm going off fifteen minutes after entering the restaurant. A window had been broken and items were taken.

23-210 Officers Hall and O'Shea responded to 31000 Telegraph on a report of a domestic dispute. Upon arrival, the officers interviewed both parties involved in the dispute, and a witness. Their investigation determined a physical altercation occurred while one of the parties tried putting a tracking device on the other's car. An arrest was made for Domestic Violence (DV) and Motor Vehicle Tracking Device Violation. The subject was found guilty of the MVTD but not guilty of DV.

23-4277 Officer Gorski was dispatched to a report of a stolen vehicle. The reporting party (RP) stated she had listed her vehicle for sale online. It was sold to an individual who provided his bank account information for a wire transfer of funds. They made arrangements for the vehicle to be towed from her place of employment the next day. A few days later, the RP received an email advising that the payment did not go through and she still owed over \$24,000 on the vehicle. Investigation determined the vehicle was towed to Detroit; however, it was sold again to a third party. Officer Gorski contacted the third party and they agreed to return the vehicle to the Franklin Police Department. The vehicle was returned to the original owner. This case is still under investigation.

23-547 Lt. Bastianelli and Officer Bonacorsi were dispatched to a 911 call where male and female voices were heard before the call disconnected. Prior to the officer's arrival, dispatch advised the female had left the scene and called from a neighbor's home to say a man was inside her house that didn't belong there. The officers went to the home and made contact with the subject at the front door. They entered the home and took the subject into custody, during which time he became aggressive. A 9mm bullet and two condoms were found in his pocket. Further investigation revealed boots and clothing discarded in the kitchen, and a handgun by the front door. The subject's vehicle was located in Southfield. The suspect, from Louisiana, had been stalking the victim and had threatened her on social media. The subject was charged with two felony charges; First Degree Home Invasion and Resisting a Police Officer.

Officers Hall and O'Shea to 31000 Telegraph on a domestic dispute. Upon e officers interviewed both olved in the dispute, and a eir investigation determined a ercation occurred while one of tried putting a tracking device er's car. An arrest was made a domestic dispute. Upon homeowners were out of town and the pet sitter found a window broken after entering the home and tending to the homeowner's pet. Numerous high-end items were taken. Investigation and work with several area departments and a task force determined this incident was part of a South American crime ring. No suspects were identified.

23-502 Bloomfield Township officers stopped a vehicle involved in a road rage incident involving a gun. It was determined that the driver of the vehicle had brandished a handgun while traveling on Telegraph Road in Bingham Farms. Officer Tucker responded to the scene. The suspect admitted to holding the gun, saying it was new and he was admiring it while driving. However, the victim stated he had yelled at her as she attempted to pass him, and he had brandished the handgun. The suspect was processed and released, and an arrest warrant was issued for Felonious Assault with a Firearm.

23-4549 While on patrol, Officer Tucker observed a vehicle with a police-style light bar in the rear window. She initiated a traffic stop and made contact with the driver who advised he had purchased the vehicle at a police auction out of state. The driver did not have his driver's license with him but said he had his CPL permit along with two revolvers in the glove box. The expired CPL permit was located along with two loaded firearms in the glove box. The firearms were unregistered. They were unloaded and secured by officers. The subject was dressed in all black, and a bullet proof vest. A local Fire Department jacket was also found in the vehicle. The subject was arrested and booked. The case is pending in court.

Officer Gorski 23-988 dispatched to 30800 Telegraph Rd. to take a report of a vehicle theft. Upon arrival, he spoke with the owner of the vehicle who stated it had been taken out of the parking lot during an approximate one hour time frame. There was no evidence found at the scene and the security cameras were not working. Three months later, the vehicle was recovered in Detroit. Fingerprints obtained at the scene were inconclusive. Detroit Police charged two subjects in possession of the vehicle with Possession of Stolen Property.







RESIDENTIAL BREAKING & ENTERING

SPECIAL ASSESSMENT DISTRICT.

- ➤ The Special Assessment District (S.A.D.) was founded in 1986. The S.A.D., paid exclusively by over twenty commercial property owners along Telegraph Rd and 13 Mile Rd. in Bingham Farms, provided for the hiring of two Police Officers to provide dedicated and specialized police patrol to the commercial district.
- ➤ The special assessment has been renewed every year since 1986. The 2023-2024 S.A.D. budget was \$390,532.04. As a direct result of the S.A.D. Officers' efforts, utilizing the latest crime prevention methods and engaging the business community, major crime has been significantly reduced and a safe environment has been created for the thousands of people working throughout the district.
- Our midnight shift Officers perform random building security checks on a nightly basis within the S.A.D. In the event an unsecured door is discovered, the Officers search the entire building and make sure that each interior office suite is secure. On the next business day, the Chief of Police, or his designee, will then follow-up with property management and advise them of the breach in security.
- ➤ During 2023, our Officers conducted 8,808 business checks over the course of the year. Officers found 74 incidents involving unsecured buildings, which pose a significant threat to the businesses which operate within those buildings.
- ➤ The chart shown right represents the top 10 responded to buildings within the S.A.D. District. A review of police calls for service identified the addresses listed in this chart as being the most responded to in the S.A.D.


GOVDELIVERY

If residents are interested in receiving crime or emergency alerts through the police department, they can sign up for email/texts from our **GOVDELIVERY** message system. This system is designed to alert our residents and business owners/operators of current crime activity in our two villages. We encourage all residents and businesses to sign up and receive **GOVEDELIVERY** notifications. You can sign up for the email alert program through the Village of Franklin website.

CRIME TIPS

The best deterrent for burglaries are trustworthy neighbors who will report suspicious activity and a good burglary alarm system. We encourage our residents to fill out the Police Department's Vacation House Check Form any time they staying away from their home. Lock up your valuables and lock your vehicles. Residents should stop their mail, keep the lawn and driveway cared for, and install timed lights, security cameras and alarms.

The Police Department partnered with Birmingham Public Schools and the private Huda School to conduct joint security response training for students, teachers and school administrators. Schools in our district have security system cameras and alarms, in consultation with our police department command personnel.
